

#### What does it mean to be a refugee?

#### A refugee is...

- outside their home country
- unable or unwilling to return due to a well-founded fear of persecution based on their:
  - Race
  - Religion
  - Nationality
  - Membership in a social group
  - Political opinion




#### Refugee Trends: Status Determinations

- Federal ORR benefits eligibility has specific criteria:
  - Refugee
  - Asylum Seeker/Asylee
  - Humanitarian Parolee
  - Special Immigrant Visa



- Special eligibility status has been extended to Afghan, Ukrainian, Cuban and Haitian entrants
- There are other populations that are NOT ORR-eligible but are still considered broadly as refugees

#### Nationwide Refugee Trends



- Federal Office of Refugee
   Resettlement (ORR) set
   nationwide 125K ceiling each
   year from 2022-2024
- Maximum of 50-60% of that ceiling is reached

# Nationwide Refugee Trends

- 2021 Operation Allies for Afghan Parolees
- 2022 Uniting for Ukraine
- 2023 Cuban/ Haitian/ Nicaraguan/ Venezuelan Parole Program
- Traditional agency-assisted resettlement continues
- Increasingly resettlement is happening through private sponsorship models i.e., individual or community groups



# North Carolina Refugee Trends

- The NC State Refugee Office (SRO) coordinates distribution of Federal ORR funds
- 57/100 NC counties have contract agencies providing services with hopes of expansion



- Historically urban/agricultural resettlement, now expanding to more counties with housing and employment challenges
- Focus on requirements for assuring provision and equity of services, especially with private sponsorship creating new dynamic



# College-Specific Refugee Trends


- Wake Tech receives federal grant funds via the NC State Refugee Office (SRO) for College and Career Readiness adult education

# Federal Immigration Policy: Updates

- DACA in limbo:
  - Current recipients can renew
  - No NEW applicants being processed
  - New Dream Act legislation introduced but not progressed



- Farm Workforce Modernization Act to establish certified agricultural worker (CAW) status stalled after House approval
- Temporary Protected Status (TPS) has been granted to ~700,000 for 16 countries of origin

# Federal Immigration Policy: Updates

 Parole-in-place for spouses of citizens allows application for green cards without leaving the country



- Specific temporary statuses granted for international humanitarian crises – i.e., Ukraine, CHNV, human trafficking, etc.
- Local governments attempting to meet the needs of expanded populations and requesting help from State and Federal agencies
- Senate has passed a bill to change policy on border management, but not passed in the House
- Current deportation at the southern border at an historic high

#### Federal Immigration Policy: Citizenship


- 878.5K eligible permanent residents gained Citizenship in Federal FY2023
- Naturalization down from previous fiscal year but up generally over the past four years
- Processing is moving faster down from high of almost a year to about five months
- Fees/applications changed April 1, 2024
  - Up from \$640 to \$760
  - BUT new criteria for 50% discounts based on household income
  - Application length reduced 35%
- New Citizenship test is being piloted, final decision in 2024

#### Federal Immigration Policy: Potential Changes & Challenges

- Repeal of TPS, parole, DACA, birthright citizenship for children of unauthorized migrants, limited asylum, reinstitute travel ban, deport/deny admission on ideological beliefs
- Suspend legal immigration process based on backlog
- Deny college students financial aid in States allowing access to instate tuition to certain immigrants – impacting 67% of college students
- Eliminate housing subsidies for individuals residing with non-US citizen or legal permanent resident
- Suspend temporary worker visas in agricultural, construction, hospitality and forestry

#### Educational Needs: Initiatives





- OCTAE & USCIS are working together for Gateways to Access and Inclusion Network (GAIN) Project focused on developing immigrant integration measures
- EARN Enhancing Access for Refugee and New Americans, working with IELCE/IE see reference page

#### Educational Needs: Measurable Indicators



- Research in the works by OCTAE and other expert agencies to develop measures of immigrant integration
- Beyond traditional MSG measures of testing, employment/wage gain, credentialing, Citizenship
- Formalizing these measures into easily trackable policy, curriculum, and support systems in existing institutions
- Creating incentives for institutions to formally pursue continuation or creation of programs for effective civic, linguistic, and economic integration

#### Educational Needs: Advancing Equity


- Executive orders issued to address equitable provision of services
- Partner with local organizations resettlement agencies, literacy programs, community-based organizations



- Assess/address students with multiple challenge factors
- Make extra efforts to create a safe and welcoming environment in unpredictable times
- Equity initiatives are underway at the State and Federal level, particularly around career pathways and technology

#### Educational Needs: "Brain Waste"

- Recently immigrated refugees coming to the US with higher levels of education
- English language skills are critical
- Mismatch of professional opportunities with existing skills/credentials
- Challenges of re-entry into fields of expertise vary, particularly medicine, law, and education
- Existing College & Career Readiness programs have different challenges to meet these needs



## Educational Need: Foreign Credentials





- Each institution, agency or company may have different credential evaluation requirements
- 'Start at the end' research expectations before engaging expensive & time-consuming effort
- Find the common denominator sometimes specific agency credential evaluations are acceptable for more than one organization




