

(Mazzeo et al., 2003, pp. 3-4)



The Two Sides

Traditional Instruction


- Predicated on the active role of the instructor and the passive role of the student
- •Uses conventional learning methodologies
- Places students in inert roles and abstract contexts

Contextualized Instruction

- •Students actively engaged in the use of content in real world context
- •Teacher is facilitator and helps to connect content and context
- •Content is made "real" by using various new methodologies







Am I Teaching Contextually?



Are new concepts presented in real-life (outside the classroom) situations and experiences that are familiar to the student?



Are concepts in examples and student exercises presented in the context of their use?



Do examples and student exercises cultivate an attitude that says, "I need to learn this"?



Are new concepts presented in the context of what the student already knows?



Do examples and student exercises include many real, believable problemsolving situations?



Key Themes

Teaching skills with direct reference to real world events and practices



Instruction in the basic skills needed in content course



Merging of basic skills and subject-area instruction

Scenarios

1 - GED preparation classes that contextualize instruction to the knowledge and skills required for high demand jobs in the area.


2 - Occupational training programs to transition learners to new careers that contextualize instruction in problems or tasks associated with career opportunities in the area.

3 - Workplace literacy programs that contextualize instruction to specific job tasks required at a company's worksite for immigrant workers.

4 - ESL programs that contextualize instruction around knowledge of employee rights in the workplace.
